Many of you will have met Glenn when he talked to us on our visit to Monbulk CFA where he volunteers.

Rohan's grandfather, Gary, was a wolf cub at 4<sup>th</sup> Glenroy cub pack and a scout at 2<sup>nd</sup> Glenroy scout troop in the 1960s and remembers the fun times and the learning he gained particularly about serving others as well as learning campcraft and bush skills. He clearly remembers

working towards his Service badge which meant visiting the homes of the elderly, helping out in their gardens and doing chores inside their homes. He became a Patrol Leader in Scouts and loved working with his Patrol in assisting them in their growth and development.

Rohan has been with us for a couple of months and has enjoyed making new friends and starting to learn the Scout ways as he and his family have joined our community once again. Make sure you make the Hickingbotham family feel very welcome!




### Cubs Descend on Rollerama Rink
